The city's initiatives, such as the Climate Plan for carbon neutrality, urban greening projects to combat climate risks, and programmes like Bordeaux Grandeur Nature to reduce social inequalities, highlight its commitment to sustainable growth and community well-being. Bordeaux's blend of heritage preservation and urban modernisation offers valuable insights into balancing local actions with a global perspective. Based on learning from Bordeaux's strategies and approaches, the DUT City Panel invites participants to present and discuss cases and strategies from other cities and deep dive into the challenge of reducing social and environmental vulnerabilities through committed urban strategies and actions for transformation processes.


# Walking tour showcasing the "Bordeaux grandeur nature" project with on-site examples

#### **Practical information:**

In 2020, the city of Bordeaux has launched the "Bordeaux grandeur nature" project, aiming to transform the city into a greener, more pleasant environment. This initiative follows a greening strategy based on four key principles: protect, renew, plant, and participate.





#### Place Pey Berland

To cool the Place Pey-Berland, a significant heat island during the summer months, a project was carried out throughout 2021 to plant around 20 trees.



Since 2021, the city of Bordeaux has launched a vast program to redevelop its school and nursery courtyards, with a budget of 18.3 million euros over the next 10 years.

Greener, fresher, more accessible and more pleasant, the courtyards are being transformed into "bushy courtyards", with redeveloped and better-shared spaces that welcome more biodiversity. The "cours buissonnières" are gradually being deployed in over a hundred





establishments. They provide for quality improvements without having to redo every surface, in the interests of sobriety and economy.

#### • Rue aux enfants

In order to offer schoolchildren and all passers-by safer, less polluted and more user-friendly spaces in front of its elementary and nursery schools, the City of Bordeaux is





implementing the "la rue aux enfants" program. This involves closing motorized vehicle traffic in front of the schools, either for entry and exit times, or permanently.

 An important part of the project is the greening of streets and public spaces to bring more shade and coolness to the city. During the visit, the streets Cours Maréchal Juin, Rue Georges-Bonnac and the square Esplanade Mériadeck will be shown as examples.






## Field Trips Day 2 (27 May): Options

### **Option 1: Visit of the GINKO Eco-Neighbourhood Housing**

#### **Practical information:**

- Meeting Point: Tram Station Berges de Lac, in front of the Pharmacy Ginko
- Time: 9:00 am
- <u>How to get there:</u> Take the tram line C direction Parc des Expositions from the city center of Bordeaux directly to Berges de Lac







The GINKO eco-neighbourhood is located to the north of Bordeaux's historic center, in what is now known as Bordeaux maritime. Ιt is an innovative neighbourhood in Bordeaux, launched by the City of Bordeaux as part of the "Bordeaux 2030, vers une metropole durable" ("Bordeaux 2030, Towards a Sustainable Metropolis") project. Built with bioclimatic architecture, low-energy buildings, renewable energy, and a focus on sustainable mobility, GINKO aims to balance environmental preservation with high quality of life. The project, developed by Bouygues Immobilier




alongside Aquitanis and Mésolia Habitat, began in 2006 and welcomed its first residents in 2012. The GINKO neighbourhood received the EcoQuartier label in 2014 and continued to grow, with the last homes delivered in 2020.

### **Option 2: Visit of the Central Train Station Bordeaux Saint-Jean**

#### **Practical Information:**

- How to get there: Bordeaux Saint-Jean train station can be reached via Tram Line C direction Les Pyrénées, Tram Line D direction Carle Vernet, or Bus Line G direction Gare Saint-Jean.



Bordeaux Saint-Jean station is entering a new phase of transformation as part of the "Grande Gare de Bordeaux" project, aimed at handling increasing passenger flows—26.3 million in 2023—and improving accessibility, intermodality, and service quality. Supported by the European Union (50% funding for preliminary studies through the "Connecting European Facilities" program) and co-financed by local and national partners, the redevelopment is led by SNCF Gares & Connexions and scheduled in phases from 2025 to 2030.





This visit will provide insights into how the station and its surroundings are evolving to meet future mobility needs. Participants will discover how transport connections are being improved across all modes—rail, tram, bus, and coach—alongside efforts to reorganize public spaces, relieve congestion, and create a more seamless experience for travelers. The tour will also explore how the station is being more closely integrated into the surrounding urban



environment through new access routes, reconfigured streets, and sustainable design features, reinforcing Bordeaux's position as a major mobility hub in France and Europe.
